

#### **Reclaiming the Narrative:**

This October, Wigston Academy Trust celebrated Black History Month with a range of activities across the month. The theme this year was 'reclaiming the narrative'.

The activities included two inter-form Black History Month quizzes where students were immersed into UK black history. Mrs Nemaura also led Black History Month assemblies across all year groups which was well received by students. Students also viewed videos of influential black people in Leicester, shown during tutor time. This included Professor Ivan Browne who is a professor of Public Health at De Montfort University and Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock whom is the Chancellor of the University of Leicester.

Additionally, a cultural dance event was held after school at the Academy led by Angel Academy where students got the opportunity to learn to dance and choreograph Jamaican and afro beats music. Furthermore, there were hair braiding workshops held at the Academy across both lunch breaks for Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 where students learnt how to braid using a hairdressing head. This was led by one of our College students, Favour, and again was appreciated by students. The Trust would like to thank Favour for volunteering to support this activity.

Lastly, on the final day of October, the canteen offered a Black History Month menu at the College and Academy, offering jerk chicken wraps and paninis. This was very successful and was sold out within minutes. Students enjoyed the Black History Month activities and are looking forward to future events.

Year 8 LED light design students have drawn by using Computer Aided Design. They are based on somewhere in the world.


